



Rejoice, thou barren that bearest not; Break forth and cry, thou that travailest not: For the desolate hath many more children than she which hath an husband.





One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, saith unto him, There is a lad here, which hath five barley-loaves, and two small fishes; but what are they among so many? And Jesus said, Make the men sit down. Now there was much grass in the place. So the men sat down, in number about five thousand. And Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed to the disciples, and the disciples to them that were set down; and likewise of the fishes, as much as they would. When they were filled, he said unto his disciples, Gather up the fragments that remain, that nothing be lost. Therefore they gathered them together, and filled twelve baskets with the fragments of the five barley-loaves, which remained over and above unto them that had eaten. Then those men, when they had seen the sign that Jesus did, said, This is of a truth that Prophet that should come into the world.

(CELEBRANT)

BLESSING and glory and thanksgiving be unto thee Almighty God, our heavenly Father, who of thy tender mercy didst give thine only Son Jesus Christ to take our nature upon him, and to suffer death upon the Cross for our redemption; who made there, by his one oblation of himself once offered, a full, perfect, and sufficient sacrifice, oblation, and satisfaction, for the sins of the whole world; and did institute, and in his holy Gospel command us to continue, a perpetual memorial of that his precious death, until his coming again.

HEAR us, O merciful Father, we most humbly beseech thee; and grant that we receiving these thy creatures of bread and wine, according to thy Son our Saviour Jesus Christ's holy institution, in remembrance of his death and passion, may be partakers of his most blessed Body and Blood; WHO, in the same night that he was betrayed, took Bread; and, when he had given thanks, he brake it; and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take, eat;

> THIS IS MY BODY WHICH IS GIVEN FOR YOU: Do this in remembrance of me."

LIKEWISE after supper he took the Cup; and, when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, saying, "Drink ye all, of this;

For this is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the remission of sins: Do this, as oft as ye shall drink it, in remembrance of me."

WHEREFORE, O Father, Lord of heaven and earth, we thy humble servants, with all thy holy Church, remembering the precious death of thy beloved Son, his mighty resurrection, and glorious ascension, and looking for his coming again in glory, do make before thee, in this sacrament of the holy Bread of eternal life and the Cup of everlasting salvation, the memorial which he hath commanded;

A ND we entirely desire thy fatherly goodness mercifully to accept this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, most humbly beseeching thee to grant, that by the merits and death of thy Son Jesus Christ, and through faith in his blood, we and all thy whole Church may obtain remission of our sins, and all other benefits of his passion; And we pray that by the power of thy Holy Spirit, all we who are partakers of this holy Communion may be fulfilled with thy grace and \clubsuit heavenly benediction; through Jesus Christ our Lord, by whom and with whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be unto thee, O Father Almighty, world without end.

THE SACRED HOST WILL BE PLACED UPON YOUR TONGUE OR IN THE PALM OF YOUR RIGHT HAND. IF YOU WISH TO RECEIVE A BLESSING, PLEASE FOLD YOUR ARMS ACROSS YOUR CHEST TO SIGNIFY THIS TO THE PRIEST.

SHOULD YOU BE UNABLE TO MANAGE STEPS, HOLY COMMUNION CAN BE ADMINIS-TERED AT YOUR PEW. PLEASE ASK ONE OF THE SIDESMEN, WHO WILL BE HAPPY TO ASSIST YOU.

THE FIRST PRAYER-BOOK EXHORTATION ENCOURAGES US TO RECEIVE THE SACRAMENT IN FAITH AND REPENTANCE, 'DISCERNING THE LORD'S BODY.'





A REQUEST FROM THE INTERIM ORGANIST: In today's liturgy, the organ, which has been silent as a solo instrument during Lent, makes a brief reappearance before becoming silent again in Passiontide. I have a request for you, the faithful of this parish. I ask of you that henceforth the applause which has greeted the conclusion of the organ music after Mass be silenced. I offer this explanation. Our Christian faith is a way of life that does not conform to the ways of the world but rather seeks to transform these ways. All that we offer in divine worship thus differs significantly from a worldly event in which applause would be appropriate. Our worship is an offering in adoration to Almighty God in thanksgiving for the many benefits that He showers upon us unworthy as we are. It is an offering in spirit and truth, our response to our creation, preservation and all the blessing of this life, most especially for the inestimable gift of His Son's sacrificial death and glorious resurrection from the dead. We bless God for the many talents that He bestows upon us, not for our own glory but rather that they may be freely shared with others and ultimately returned to Him, the giver of all good gifts. In respect to this, I think of the great Baroque composer J. S. Bach, whose musical output ranks among the greatest achievements of Western civilization. He certainly deserves our praise yet, on many of his compositions he wrote in Latin *soli Deo gloria*, only to the glory of God. May all that we offer at S. Bartholomew's Church be only to God's glory, a pure and unspoiled offering like that of the ancient priest Melchizedek the King of Salem, for this our sacred space is none other than the house of God and the gate of heaven

DEVOTIONAL VIGNETTE

TODAY THERE IS A PAUSE of holy joy and spiritual comfort which the Church, like a good mother, gives us in the middle of the Lenten austerity so that we may renew our strength. "Rejoice, O Jerusalem," the Introit of today's Mass sings, "and all you who love her, leap with joy and be filled with the abundance of her delights." What are these the lights? The gospel (John 6:1-15) answers the question by the narrative of the multiplication of the loaves, the great miracle bike which Jesus meant to prepare the people for the announcement of a much more startling miracle, the institution of the Holy Eucharist, in which He, the Master, would become our Bread, the "living bread which came down from heaven" (ibid. 6:41) to nourish our souls. This is the cause of our joy, the source of our delight. Jesus is the Bread of life, always at our disposal to appease our hunger.

Although Jesus appreciates spiritual values much better than we, He does not forget or despise the material necessities of life. Today's Gospel shows him surrounded by the crowd which had followed Him to hear His teachings. Jesus thinks of their hunger, and to provide for them, performs one of His most outstanding miracles. With his blessing, five loaves of bread and two fishes suffice to feed five thousand people, with twelve basketfuls left over.

Jesus knows that when a person is tormented by hunger or material needs, he is unable to apply himself to the things of the Spirit. Charity likewise requires of us this understanding of the bodily necessities of others, a practical understanding which translates itself into efficacious action. "If a brother or sister be naked and want daily food, and one of you say to them, 'go in peace'... yet give them not those things that are necessary for the body, what shall it profit?" (James 2:15–16).

The Apostles had suggested to the Master that He dismiss the crowd "that they may by themselves victuals" (Matthew 14:15). Jesus did not agree but provided for them Himself. We, too, must strive, as far as we are able, to show ourselves solicitous for the needs of others.
