

Welcome to S. Bart's, Regent Park!

The Church, which commemorates throughout the year in the Holy Eucharist all the mysteries of our Lord's life, today lays special stress on the institution of that Sacrament and of the Priesthood. This Mass carries out more than any other the command of Christ to His priests to renew the Last Supper, during which He instituted His immortal presence among us at the very moment His death was being plotted. The Church, setting aside her mourning to-day, celebrates the Holy Sacrifice with joy. The crucifix is covered with a white veil, her ministers are vested in white, and the bells are rung at the Gloria in Excelsis. They are not rung again until Holy Saturday.

After the Mass the Altar is stripped in order to show that the Holy Sacrifice is interrupted and will not be offered again to God until Holy Saturday. The priest therefore has consecrated two hosts, for, on Good Friday the Church refrains from renewing on the altar the Sacrifice of Calvary. On this Holy Thursday, let us receive from the priest's hands that Holy Victim who offers Himself upon the altar, and in this holy manner fulfil our Easter duty.

The Epistle is written in the eleventh chapter of the First Epistle of Paul the Apostle to the Corinthians, beginning at the twenty-third verse.


BRETHREN, I have received of the Lord that which also I delivered unto you, That the Lord Jesus, the same night in which he was betrayed, took bread; and when he had given thanks, he brake it, and said, Take, eat; this is my body, which is broken for you: this do in remembrance of me. After the same manner also he took the cup, when he had supped, saying, This cup is the new covenant in my blood: this do ye, as oft as ye drink it, in remembrance of me. For as often as ye eat this bread, and drink this cup, ye do show the Lord's death till he come. Wherefore, whosoever shall eat this bread, and drink this cup of the Lord, unworthily, shall be guilty of the body and blood of the Lord. But let a man examine himself, and so let him eat of that bread, and drink of that cup. For he that eateth

and drinketh unworthily eateth and drinketh condemnation to himself, not discerning the Lord's body.







 - The Holy Gospel is written in the thirteenth chapter of the Gospel according to S. John, beginning at the first verse.
- Ry Glory be to thee, O Lord.

BEFORE before the feast of the passover, when Jesus knew that his hour was come that he should depart out of this world unto the Father, having loved his own which were in the world, he loved them unto the end. And supper being ended, the devil having now put into the heart of Judas Iscariot, Simon's son, to betray him; Jesus knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he was come from God, and went to God; he riseth from supper, and laid aside his garments; and took a towel, and girded himself. After that he poureth water into a bason, and began to wash the disciples' feet, and to wipe them with the towel wherewith he was girded. Then cometh he to Simon Peter: and Peter saith unto him, Lord,

dost thou wash my feet? Jesus answered and said unto him, What I do thou knowest not now; but thou shalt know hereafter. Peter saith unto him, Thou shalt never wash my feet. Jesus answered him, If I wash thee not, thou hast no part with me. Simon Peter saith unto him, Lord, not my feet only, but also my hands and my head. Jesus saith to him, He that is washed needeth not save to wash his feet, but is clean every whit: and ye are clean, but not all. For he knew who should betray him; therefore said he, Ye are not all clean. So after he had washed their feet, and had taken his garments, and was set down again, he said unto them, Know ye what I have done to you? Ye call me Master and Lord: and ye say well; for so I am. If I then, your Lord and Master, have washed your feet; ye also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have given you an example, that ye should do as I have done to you.

MUSIC NOTE:

Tonight's choral music features a mass setting and motet by English composer William Byrd (1540-1623), whose ingenious, assured and sublime compositional skills place him in the small and select pantheon of the greatest English composers of all time. An English Roman Catholic in a time of great religious upheaval, Byrd managed to remain in favour with Catholic and Protestant monarchs alike, serving Mary Tudor, Elizabeth I and James I as a Gentleman of the Chapel Royal. His motet Ave verum corpus, sung regularly by countless vocal ensembles all over the world, reveals his Catholic sensibilities through his selection of a Latin text venerating the Real Presence of the body of Christ in the Sacrament. Byrd's effective use of harmonies and intentional use of dissonance render both this motet and his Mass for Four Voices at once beautiful, colourful and penitential. Our Communion motet this evening represents the Franco-Flemish school of composition that reached its zenith a couple of decades before the birth of William Byrd. Pierre de la Rue's stunning setting of O salutaris hostia unfolds each line of text with simple harmonies and sophisticated melodic gestures that pass from voice to voice, creating short meditative journeys that begin and end in patient stillness.
