TODAY! EVENSONG & LECTURE AT S. OLAVE'S with our own Katherine Hill speaking on "The Song-Book of Anna of Cologne." Sunday, 26 January at 4:00 p.m. at our sister parish, S. Olave's Church (360 Windermere Avenue, near Bloor and Jane). Around the year 1500, Beguine nun Anna of Cologne cherished a pocket-sized song-book, full of touching devotional texts, popular tunes, and Gregorian chant (including an early version of 'In dulci jubilo'). In this lecture-demonstration, singer and medieval fiddler Katherine Hill will present the history of this remarkable book, as well a selection of its Latin and German (late-Medieval Cologne dialect) songs, with some help from the audience!



Turning to praise each 'moment's monument'.



™ DEVOTIONAL VIGNETTE **№**

TODAY'S GOSPEL (Matthew 8:1–13) places before us two miracles of Jesus, two profound lesson in humility, faith, and charity.

Observe the humble faith of the leper: "Lord, if thou wilt, thou canst make me clean." He is so certain that Jesus can heal him that he feels nothing else is necessary for his cure other then the Lord's will. Christian faith does not wander about in subtle reasonings; its logic is simple: God can do all that He wills; therefore, His will alone is necessary. Yet the leper does not insist; one who lives by faith knows that God always wills



whatever is best for him, even if it brings him suffering. Therefore, instead of insisting, he prefers to abandon himself to God's good pleasure.

Next comes the centurion. The strong, proud Roman soldier is not ashamed to personally beg Jesus, a Galilean, to help his paralyzed servant. Our Lord is touched by this humble, charitable act, and says at once, "I shall go and heal him!" But the centurion continues, "I am not worthy that thou shouldst enter under my roof, but only say the word, and my servant shall be healed." At this point humility becomes still more profound, and faith reaches its maximum: it is not necessary for the Lord to go; His power is so great that a word spoken from afar suffices to perform any miracle. Jesus Himself "marvelled and said: 'Amen I say to you, I have not found so great faith in Israel!" Is this not a complaint against those who live so close to Him, who perhaps live in His own house [i.e., members of the Church], receiving constant favours from Him, while their faith remains very weak and therefore inefficacious?

Devotional Societies at S. Bart's









THE CONFRATERNITY OF THE BLESSED SACRAMENT: Founded in 1862 to honour the Presence of Our Lord in the Sacrament and to promote appropriate preparation and devotion to the Holy Eucharist, the Parish Cell of the Confraternity meets on the fourth Wednesday in October, December, February, April, and June for education and fellowship and to sing Vespers of the Blessed Sacrament followed by Benediction.

OUR LADY OF WALSINGHAM: A proto-cell of Our Lady of Walsingham (a cell not yet granted official status by the Shrine at Walsingham) meets on the second Wednesday of September, November, January, March, and May for education and devotion.

GUILD OF ALL SOULS: The principal objective of the Guild is to promote the Church's teaching of intercessory prayer for the dying and for the repose of the souls of the departed. The S. Bartholomew's Branch of the Guild (under the patronage of Our Lady of Solitude and S. Dismas) meets on the fourth Wednesday of September, November (for the Annual Guild Requiem), January, March, and May for education and devotions (often Vespers of the Dead).

SOCIETY OF MARY: Founded as an Anglican society to love and honour Mary, the society is dedicated to the glory of God in 'honour of the Holy Incarnation under the invocation of Our Lady, Help of Christians'. The Toronto Ward meets at S. Bartholomew's on the second Wednesday of October, December, February, April, and June for fellowship, education, and recitation of the Holy Rosary and Benediction.

Please note: On months during which a society does not hold a meeting, the members of that society make their corporate communion at the Sunday High Mass immediately preceding their normal Wednesday (i.e., either the second or fourth Sunday of the month).
