
# PARISH ANNOUNCEMENTS \*

## MUSIC NOTE

THIS MORNING'S MUSIC makes the most of our treasured Anglican musical traditions, employing ancient chants, carols, four and five-voice polyphony, and robustly joyful hymns. The liturgy starts with a very short



medieval Easter Play (the *Visitatio Sepulchri*, or the Visitation at the Grave) first sung in a Dutch Convent around the year 1200. Many versions of this play were created and sung throughout Europe in the Middle Ages, all based on the moment when Mary Magdalene, Mary and Salome come to Jesus' sepulchre (Luke 24 and John 18), only to find an Angel sitting on the gravestone, asking *'Quem queritis?'* ('Whom seek ye?'). We can only imagine the delight of the originators of such dramas in acting out and viewing the moment where the resurrection becomes known.

During the procession at the beginning of mass, we will sing the sixth-century hymn *Salve*, *festa dies* (Hail thee, festival day), set to music by renowned English composer Ralph Vaughan Williams in 1906. We will use for the first time the *Credo Cardinalis* (the Cardinal's Creed), sung across the Anglo-Catholic world, and found in manuscripts from the later middle ages. Our mass setting likely once resounded in the golden-mosaicked splendour of St Mark's in Venice, where composer Andrea Gabrieli (1533-1585) had fine singers and a sublime acoustic in which to weave beautiful choral lines. We will hear Gabrieli's motet *Maria Magdalene* at the Communion, echoing again the story of the *Visitatio Sepulchri*.

Our Offertory motet features the delightful Dutch carol, *This joyful Eastertide*, no doubt being sung this morning in countless churches throughout Christendom, and our mass ends with the triumphant hymn, *Thine be the Glory*, sung to a tune written by G.F. Handel (1746) for his Oratorio *Judas Maccabaeus*.

#### **EASTER COMMUNION**

by Gerard Manley Hopkins (1844-1889)

Pure fasted faces draw unto this feast: God comes all sweetness to your Lenten lips. You striped in secret with breath-taking whips, Those crooked rough-scored chequers may be pieced To crosses meant for Jesu's; you whom the East With draught of thin and pursuant cold so nips Breathe Easter now; you serged fellowships, You vigil-keepers with low flames decreased,

God shall o'er-brim the measures you have spent With oil of gladness, for sackcloth and frieze And the ever-fretting shirt of punishment Give myrrhy-threaded golden folds of ease. Your scarce-sheathed bones are weary of being bent: Lo, God shall strengthen all the feeble knees.

# **▼** DEVOTIONAL VIGNETTE **▼**

THE GOSPEL (Mark 16:1-7) places before our eyes the faithful holy women who, at the first rays of the Sunday dawn, run to the sepulcher, and on the way, wonder: "who will roll back the stone from the door of the sepulchre for us?" This preoccupation, although it is well justified on account of the size and weight of the stone, does not deter them from proceeding with their plans; they are too much taken up with the desire of finding Jesus! And behold! hardly have they arrived when they see "the stone rolled back."



They enter the tomb and find an Angel who greets them with the announcement: "He is risen; He is not here." At this time, Jesus does not let Himself be found or seen; but a little later when, in obedience to the command of the Angel, the

women leave the tomb to bring the news to the disciples, He will appear before them saying, "All hail!" (Matthew 28:9), and their joy will be overwhelming.

We, too, have a keen desire to find the Lord; perhaps we have been seeking Him for many years. Further, this desire may have been accompanied by serious preoccupation with the question of how we might rid ourselves of the obstacles and roll away from our souls the stone which has prevented us from finding the Lord, from giving ourselves entirely to Him, and from letting Him triumph in us. Precisely because we want to find the Lord, we have already overcome many obstacles, sustained by His grace; divine Providence has helped us roll away many stones, overcome many difficulties. Nevertheless, the search for God is progressive, and must be maintained during our whole life. For this reason, following the example of the holy women, we must always have a holy preoccupation about finding the Lord, a preoccupation which will make us industrious and diligent in seeking Him, and at the same time confident of the divine aid, since the Lord will certainly take care that we arrive where our own strength could never bring us, because He will do for us what we cannot do for ourselves.

Every year Easter marks a time of renewal in our spiritual life, and our search for God; every year we re-ascend the path toward Him in novitate vitae, in newness of life (Romans 6:4).
